Message from the Headteacher

Our students in Years 11 and 13 have just two weeks remaining of the assessment period; the deadline for assessment 'evidence' is May 28. Our students continue to impress with their engagement and determination to perform at the very highest level. Details regarding the arrangements that are being

made for Years 11 and 13 provision in term 6 have been circulated. It is worth noting that it is not just students in Years 11 and 13 who have been sitting assessments; students in Years 10 and 12 will also receive Teacher Assessment Grades for some subjects. Mr Skinner has been massively impressed by the manner in which our Year 10 students have responded in their assessments for RS. They will receive this GCSE grade in August before preparing for the rest of their GCSEs in Year 11.

In last week's newsletter, I focused on the community groups that have supported the town through lockdown. I am incredibly proud of our students who are involved in the Seaford Youth Forum. Hope Reilly, who is the chair of the forum, has asked me to publicise their latest project which is raising funds for a breast cancer charity through bra recycling. More details can be found here. Bra Recycling - Against Breast Cancer. There will be collection points in our receptions, on both sites, so that our school community can support the youth forum and this excellent charity.

Our students continue to make a huge difference to the environment. In his role as the Young Mayor of Seaford, James Jenkins makes a positive contribution in this area and the local press this week highlighted the role he has played in raising funds for four new water refill stations in Seaford. The refill campaign will have a significant impact on the Seaford wide campaign to reduce the use of single-use plastics.

There have been a number of significant announcements from the DfE this week regarding the covid situation in schools. The latest guidance can be found here.. It is extremely exciting that restrictions are being eased and the government is no longer recommending the wearing of face masks for students in lessons. Our students have been fantastic in terms of mask compliance and we will continue with mask wearing in communal areas and corridors. Those who feel more confident wearing the masks in lessons will also be able to continue to do so but this is no longer compulsory; we will review these arrangements at the end of term 5. Adult visitors to the school should continue to wear masks and all other control measures will remain in place until the timetable change in July.

This week we have been sharing our plans for the summer school with our four Seaford Primary feeder schools which will support their transition into Seaford Head School. It is an extremely exciting programme that has been organised by Mr Whittaker and activities include: sports, dance, theatre and film making, science experiments and music lessons. There will be some 'booster' academic sessions for Year 10 students progressing into Year 11. The two week programme starts on16 August. Our Years 11 and 13 will be in school over the summer holidays to collect their results; results day for our Year 13s is 10 August and GCSE Results day for our Year 11s is 12 August. Enrolment day for our Year 11 students progressing into the sixth form is Friday 13 August.

Next Thursday evening at 5.30pm, I will be hosting the termly Parent Council Meeting. We will be looking at: an evaluation of covid provision, lockdown arrangements that should be maintained, new timetable changes and the PSHE curriculum. ATR launched World Turtle Day to increase respect and knowledge for the world's oldest creatures. These gentle animals have been around for 200 million years, yet they are rapidly disappearing as a result of smuggling, the exotic food industry, habitat destruction, global warming and the cruel pet trade. It is a very sad time for turtles and tortoises of the world. (See slide show here.)

Biologists and other experts predict the disappearance of turtles and tortoises within the next 50 years. Adults and children can do a few small things that can help save turtles and tortoises for future generations.

- · Never buy a turtle or tortoise from a pet shop as it increases demand from the wild.
- Never remove turtles or tortoises from the wild unless they are sick or injured.
- If a tortoise is crossing a busy highway, pick it up and send it in the same direction it was going – if you try to make it go back, it will turn right around again.
- Write letters to legislators asking them to keep sensitive habitat preserved or closed to
 off road vehicles and to prevent off shore drilling that can lead to endangered sea turtle
 deaths.
- Report cruelty or illegal sales of turtles and tortoises to your local animal control shelter.
- Report the use of tiny turtles as prizes at carnivals and other events. It's illegal.

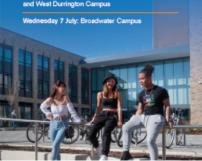
