

7 September 2018 Term 1: Week 1 Weekly Message from the Headteacher: Mr Ellis

I hope that all members of our community enjoyed a lovely summer holiday.

A highlight of my holiday was sharing in our students' joy as they celebrated fantastic outcomes at GCSE and

A-Level on our two results' days. We had predicted an increase in attainment for our sixth form students and this cohort did not disappoint. with the proportion of students securing 3 A*-C grades increasing by 30%. At GCSE level the amount of students achieving a strong pass in both English and Mathematics increased by 5%; whilst outcomes in Chemistry, Physics, Biology, French, Spanish, Media, Business Studies, Food and Product Design were also significantly above the national average. A detailed breakdown of individual successes will be posted on the school's website and all our students should feel extremely proud of their achievements. They would not secure these fantastic outcomes without receiving great support from home and school at every step of the way. There were also some very promising outcomes for our Year 12s in their mock/AS examinations. A significant number of this cohort is applying to Oxbridge and other Russell Group universities and the results secured this summer should give these students increased confidence as they work through the application process.

We welcomed all students back on Tuesday of this week and, with one hundred and fifty students in the sixth form, we are accommodating our largest ever cohort in S6H. Although numbers are growing, students continue to benefit from being in relatively small classes and having access to outstanding personalised pastoral support. This really is special provision and we have some outstanding new recruits who are clearly determined to take full advantage of the opportunities on offer.

Visiting lessons on Tuesday morning, I was really impressed by how quickly our students slip immediately back into study mode. It is an obvious benefit of starting the 'new timetable' in July that our students are able to 'hit the ground running' in September. The outstanding outcomes they achieve is also based on their commitment to independent study. Parents and carers of children, across all year groups, can support them by ensuring that they develop good habits and are devoting a couple of hours to quiet study every evening.

Book of the Week

Recommendation of the Week: 'War Horse' by Michael Morpurgo

Nominated by: Mr Jack Gant

Summary:

War Horse is a children's novel by English author Michael Morpurgo. It was first published in Great Britain by Kaye and Ward in 1982. The story recounts the experiences of Joey, a horse purchased by the Army for service in World War I, France and the attempts of young Albert, his previous owner, to bring him safely home. It formed the basis of both an award winning play (2007) and an acclaimed film adaptation (2011) by Steven Spielberg.



This is a great novel to read after or before reading Private Peaceful in Year 7. It takes the reader on a journey of love, friendship and overcoming difficulties. It may serve to create an empathetic response in the reader after discovering the traumatic experiences of Joey and his time at both the farm and later at war.

Seaford Head School Gets a Gold Mark!

Seaford Head School has been awarded the prestigious GOLD Science Mark, in recognition of the excellent work undertaken by their science department.



Science Mark was created by STEM Learning to recognise and celebrate best practice in science departments across the UK. Schools and colleges receive the Science Mark when they can show that they are delivering inspiring lessons for students and demonstrate their department's commitment to high-quality science education.

Science has long been a strength at Seaford Head where staff not only deliver outstanding science lessons but also run excellent extracurricular activities such as STEM club, an annual Science Fair and other STEM career workshops and events.

Rob Handy, Assistant Head teacher and STEM coordinator at Seaford Head School, said:

"We are absolutely delighted to be recognised by STEM Learning in this way. The GOLD Science Mark puts our science department in the top 15% in the country which is testament to the hard work of staff and students in the science department. We are incredibly proud of this year's exam results, both at KS4 where results are well above the national average and KS5 where A-level Physics was a particular strength. It is also encouraging that the majority of our A level students go on to peruse a STEM subject at university."

Clarinet Group Lessons - Taster Term



At Seaford Head we would students to learn how to play Clarinet

This is a new scheme aimed at students in Year 7 & 8 who are keen to take on a new challenge

Lessons will start in September and run until Christmas.

- Lessons will be 30 minutes in length
- Students will be taught in small groups (4 to 6 students per group)
- Lessons will take place during the school day and the day/time will change each week to ensure students do not miss the same academic lessons.
- Due to a generous donation from a local music charity (and the size of our teaching groups) the cost of this taster term is only £40 (compared to £98 for group lessons with East Sussex Music Service)
- Students will be able to borrow a clarinet for free for the duration of the Autumn
 - Mr Faulkner will teach the clarinet lessons
- Students will be expected to take part in a short whole group performance in the Christmas showcase event in December
- Students are expected to complete the full course of lessons before deciding whether or not to continue after Christmas.

All students who are interested in taking part in the scheme need to send Mr. Faulkner an email. The email should state why you want to learn the clarinet in a couple of sentences (or 50 words).

Students will then be given a permission slip to take home for their parents to complete from the finance department and lessons will start from 17 September.
